chosen and stocked up on boot disinfectant and/or boot/shoe coverings?		
provided ample hand wash stations, hand sanitizer, and trash cans with lids?		
added latched and locked gates with signage to prohibit entry to vulnerable areas?		

## **Other Visitor Tips**

Post your visitor policy on your website and at point of entry.

To lower daily risk, choose certain days and hours for visitors.

Do not allow visitors to feed or come in direct contact with your animals and think of providing them with a webcam viewing of protected areas.

Clearly mark designated parking areas with multiple signs, poles, and barrier tape or rope.

Add to the chore list the replenishing of soap, towels, hand sanitizer, disposable boot covers, boot wash and disinfectant.
