Dear Mr. Valleau:

Thank you for your letter dated May 5, 2006 requesting information or recommendations from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. This letter provides the Service's response pursuant to Section 7 of the Endangered Species Act (ESA), as amended (16 U.S.C. 1531-1543), and the Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act, as amended (16 U.S.C. 661-667d).

<u>Project Name/Location:</u> TransCanada transmission corridor – Kibby Twp. to Wyman Substation

Log Number: 06-306

Based on the information currently available to us, no federally-listed species under the jurisdiction of the Service are known to occur in the project area, with the exception of occasional, transient bald eagles (*Haliaeetus leucocephalus*). As we have discussed previously, the Service recommends that ½ mile on either side of the transmission corridor route be surveyed for bald eagle nests. Optimal timing for surveys is April or May early in the incubation period. TransCanada and TRC conducted a survey in the spring of 2006 and a new eagle nest was located near the Wyman Substation. New eagle nests could be established in the future. We recommend that an eagle nest survey be completed prior to construction of transmission corridor to ensure that construction activities do not adversely affect nesting eagles. Accordingly, no further action is required under Section 7 of the ESA, unless: (1) new information reveals impacts of this identified action that may affect listed species or critical habitat in a manner not previously considered; (2) this action is subsequently modified in a manner that was not considered in this review; or (3) a new species is listed or critical habitat determined that may be affected by the identified action.
