
MAINE VITAL STATISTICS SYSTEM: 1993 - 2002 (preliminary)

- ▶ In the 10 year period, 1993 2002, there were 1,320 home births in Maine. Each year, 100 to 150 Maine babies are born at home - about 1% of all Maine births - a rate consistent with national trends1.
- On average, woman who delivered their babies at home were older than

women who delivered their babies in a hospital. Women 30 years old and older accounted for 57% of all home births, while women in this age group rep-



resented 35% of hospital births.

- One percent of all Maine women who had babies during 1993 2002 delivered their babies at home; however, 31/2% of Maine women 40 years old or older delivered at home compared to ½% of women younger
- Mothers of home delivered babies were more likely to be married and to have more education than the mothers of hospital born babies. However, mothers delivering at home were also more likely to have a late start for prenatal care or no prenatal care at all, and fewer overall prenatal care visits

- Babies born at home tended to weigh more than those born in hospitals. During 1993 - 2002, on average, babies born at home weighed 8 pounds 1 ounce - a half pound more than those born in hospitals (7 pounds 5 ounces).
- Twenty-six percent of the babies born at home weighed 4000 grams (8 pounds 13 ounces) or more. This proportion was significantly greater than for babies born in hospitals (14%).

Notes: 2001 and 2002 Maine data are preliminary. All Maine data are for resident births only. Births occurring out of state to Maine residents, and all births occurring to Maine residents in a place other than a hospital or a home are excluded from this analysis.
