

INJURY DEATHS TO RESIDENTS 1-19 YEARS OLD

Maine 1992 (Preliminary Data)

- Injury, intentional and unintentional, is the leading cause of death for Maine residents aged 1 - 19; it is the 5th leading cause of death for all Maine residents.
- Injury deaths account for 5% of the deaths to Maine citizens; however, of deaths to children 1 - 14 years old, 40% are due to injuries; for those 15 - 19 years old, injuries account for 85% of deaths.
- 104 Maine residents, 1 19 years old, died in 1992. Forty-eight of those deaths were due to unintentional injuries, 15 were due to suicides, and 2 were due to homicides.



- Almost 80% of unintentional injury deaths in this age group (1 19 years old) involve motor vehicles; only half of these incidents involve a collision with another vehicle.
- Suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death in the 15 19 year old age group, and it is tied as the 4th leading cause (with infectious and parasitic diseases) for children aged 1 - 14.
- Males account for 68% of injury deaths (intentional and unintentional) to residents 1 - 19 years old, and 73% of injury deaths in the 15 - 19 year old age group.
