



- Nearly 77% of Maine women went for their prenatal care visits to a private doctor's office or HMO, 10% to a hospital clinic, 8% to a community/rural health center, and 5% to other locations.
- During prenatal care visits, 95% of mothers were asked if they were drinking alcoholic beverages. However, at private doctor's offices and HMOs, only 76% of drinking mothers were being counselled about how drinking during pregnancy could affect their babies. At community/rural health centers, nearly 91% of drinking mothers were counselled. This difference is statistically significant\*.
- During prenatal care visits, nearly 100% of providers asked women if they were smoking. 92% of smoking women were counselled about how smoking during pregnancy could affect their babies. There were no significant differences\* between any of the prenatal care settings and counselling about the effects of smoking.

\* Unless noted, differences in rates are not statistically significant, i.e., they could be accounted for by chance alone.
