
MAINE PREGNANCY RISK ASSESSMENT MONITORING SYSTEM (PRAMS): 1997


► Healthy Maine 2000 objectives include an objective to increase the proportion of infants who are breastfed one week or more to 75% and to increase to 50% those who are breastfed for 13 weeks or longer.

In 1997, 71% of Maine's new mothers breastfed their infants after delivery. This was a Prevalence and Duration of Breastfeeding Maine: 1997 significant increase over

1990 when 59% of new mothers breastfed.

Women who have 12 or more years of education are more likely to breast feed their babies than other mothers.





- Women who breastfed were more likely to be married and were more likely to have delivered an infant with normal birth weight.
- ▶ In 1997, 29% of new mothers did not breastfeed. They gave a variety of reasons for making that choice:

REASONS GIVEN FOR CHOOSING NOT TO BREASTFEED *

- 67% didn't want to
- 8% thought breastfeeding took too long
- 21% had to go to work/school
 6% thought bottle feeding was better
- 10% were taking medications
 28% gave other reasons
- Respondents could check more than 1 reason.
- ► Many health care providers discussed breastfeeding with their prenatal care patients; of those women, those with annual incomes below \$8,000 were 17% less likely to breastfeed than women with incomes between \$8,000 and \$20,000, and 29% less likely to than women with incomes of \$20,000 or more.
- Of the women who breastfed after delivery, approximately 40% had discontinued by the time they completed the PRAMS survey. The most frequently cited reasons for stopping were the need to return to work or school (28%) and not having enough milk (28%).
